Pathways salutes Swiss doctor

Dr. Elsbeth K ng of Switzerland was given the lifetime achievement award by the Glenview-based Pathways Awareness Foundation for her pioneering efforts in promoting the importance of early detection and early intervention in children with suspected neuromotor difficulties.

The award was presented Nov. 14 during the foundation's 16th anniversary dinner, held at the Four Season Hotel in Chicago, when it was acknowledged that her work had been the inspiration for Pathways Awareness Foundation's mission.

About 400 people attended the dinner, co-chaired by Shirley Ryan of Winnetka, co-founder of Pathways; Maggie Daley, wife of

Chicago Mayor Richard M. Daley; John W. Rogers, Jr., chair and CEO of Ariel Capital Management, and Andrew J. McKenna, chair of McDonald's Corporation.

After the award presentation there was a round-table discussion with healthcare professionals on the importance of early detection.

The event raised \$500,000 for Pathways, established in 1988 and based on the early intervention principles of Dr. K ng and her British colleague Mary B. Quinton, called Neuro-Developmental Therapy. NDT is the cornerstone of many interventions used at Pathways Center for Children in Glenview, which provides nearly 1,000 hours of treatment for children and youths each month.
