Since 2002 Dr. Geleske has been a member of the AAP Medical Home Initiative Project Advisory Committee and represents the AAP on the Secretary of Health and Human Services Advisory Committee on Hereditary Disorders and Genetic Disease in Newborns and Children. In addition, he is working on the development of an AAP eQIPP module on Newborn Screening. IDHFS DIRECTOR RELEASES REPORT ON MEDICAID IMPROVEMENTS

Julie Hamos, Director of the Illinois Department of Healthcare and Family Services (IDHFS) since April 2010, recently released a report on the significant changes being undertaken to improve the Illinois Medicaid program and to plan for national healthcare reform, many of which have had ICAAP involvement and support. Initiatives highlighted include changing to a durable medical card and paying out performance bonuses to Illinois Health Connect providers, among others. Ms. Hamos also recently took steps to revitalize the Medicaid Advisory Committee (MAC), a stakeholder group that provides critical input to IDHFS. To that end, Director Hamos contacted ICAAP to ensure pediatrician representation. Dr. Ed Pont, ICAAP past President, is now serving on the MAC.

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POLICY POINTS

A MATTER OF PATIENT SAFETY – AAP BACKS MANDATORY FLU SHOTS FOR HEALTH WORKERS

The American Academy of Pediatrics (AAP) released a new [policy statement](#) emphasizing the need for hospitals to create and enforce mandatory flu vaccination programs for all health care workers, except those exempt for medical or religious reasons, to prevent the spread of the virus to patients. Just 40% of health workers receive a yearly flu shot, even though an 80% rate would offer the best protection in

healthcare facilities. Healthcare workers can transmit influenza virus to patients and coworkers before the onset of symptoms and during symptomatic illness. Even hospital cafeteria and laundry workers can indirectly pass the virus on to patients. Such infections are common, contribute to patient morbidity and mortality, and create a financial burden on healthcare systems.

AAP joins other membership organizations that also have called for mandatory annual influenza immunization for healthcare workers including: the Infectious Diseases Society of America, the American College of Physicians, the Association for Professionals in Infection Control and Epidemiology, and the National Foundation for Patient Safety. Many hospitals and some healthcare systems already have adopted mandatory immunization policies. Immunizing all healthcare workers also will serve as an example to patients, highlighting the safety and effectiveness of annual immunization. Healthcare workers fail to lead by example if they recommend universal immunization, including influenza vaccine, to their patients, but do not require it of themselves.

AAP RELEASES POLICY STATEMENT ON RECOMMENDATIONS FOR INFLUENZA IMMUNIZATION OF CHILDREN

On August 30, 2010, the American Academy of Pediatrics (AAP) published a policy statement online made by AAP's Committee on Infectious Diseases.

Titled "[Recommendations for Prevention and Control of Influenza in Children, 2010-2011](#)," this statement updates the current recommendations for routine use of trivalent seasonal influenza vaccine and antiviral medications for the prevention and treatment of influenza in children. ASTHMA INHALER SELF-CARRY LAW NOW IN EFFECT

On August 20, 2010, Governor Pat Quinn signed HB 5836, which removes a barrier from students carrying and using their quick relief asthma inhalers at school. The new legislation eliminates the need for a doctor's note, and instead permits students to carry and administer their quick relief asthma inhalers at school as long as they submit a copy of their prescription and a note from their parent or guardian. For children with asthma in your practice, make sure they are provided with the asthma inhaler pharmacy label packaging. School staff will need to see the pharmacy prescription label and will provide parents and guardians a consent form to sign.

NEW ILLINOIS SCHOOL FOOD ALLERGY GUIDELINES

Per Public Act 96-0349, Illinois State Board of Education (ISBE), in conjunction with the Illinois Department of Public Health (IDPH), released the Guidelines for Managing Life-Threatening Food Allergies in Illinois Schools. These guidelines were assembled

by an ad hoc committee comprised of experts in the field of food allergens, representatives on behalf of students with food allergies, representatives from public schools management organizations, and representatives from two statewide teachers' organizations. By January 1, 2011, each school board is required to implement a policy based on these guidelines. Also, at least every two years, an in-service training program for school personnel who work with students must be conducted by persons with expertise in anaphylactic reactions and management.

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IMMUNIZATION UPDATES

I-CARE NOW COMPATIBLE WITH ELECTRONIC MEDICAL RECORDS

Looking for a way to improve immunization rates in your practice? Searching for an effective way to accurately track patient immunization records? I-CARE, Illinois Comprehensive Automated Immunization Registry Exchange can help your practice with all of the above! I-CARE saves time tracking and reporting immunizations providing practices a centralized place to track immunization records, print

immunization records and school physical forms, generate reminder letters for immunizations that are due and more. An additional benefit is that immunization data collected through I-CARE may help providers achieve minimum bonus payments of \$20 per patient through Illinois Health Connect.

Additionally, in an effort to allow Electronic Medical/Health Records (EMR/EHR) to share immunization data with other systems such as I-CARE, the Illinois Department of Public Health (IDPH) has developed a standard to exchange data between incompatible systems. This international standard for exchanging health information is called Health Level Seven (HL7).

IDPH is implementing a HL7 data exchange between I-CARE and immunization providers in two phases:

- Phase 1: A one-way data transfer of unsolicited vaccine record updates to the statewide registry that will allow immunization providers using their own EMR system to send data to I-CARE. This phase is currently in-progress.
- Phase 2: A two-way data transfer of vaccine record queries and responses that will allow immunization providers using their own EMR system to query I-CARE for a patient's immunization records (not found in their own EMR system) and I-CARE will send the patient's immunization information back. (Phase 2 is expected to be completed in spring 2011)

2010-11 INFLUENZA SEASON RESOURCES

The Vaccine Information Statements (VISs) for the 2010-11 inactivated influenza (TIV, injectable) and the live, intranasal influenza (LAIV, nasal) vaccine are now available in English, Spanish, and a few other foreign languages. The new VISs are intended for use during the 2010-11 influenza vaccination season and replace both 2009-10 seasonal influenza vaccine VISs, which were dated 8/11/09. IAC has developed a new piece for healthcare professionals titled "[Guide for determining the number of doses of influenza vaccine to give to children ages 6 months through 8 years during the 2010-11 influenza season.](#)" This handout is based on the related guidance found in the Advisory Committee on Immunization Practice's influenza recommendations for the 2010-11 season in a user-friendly table format.

IAC has created a handout titled "[Influenza Vaccine Products for the 2010-11 Influenza Season](#)" that provides information about influenza vaccines available for the 2010-2011 influenza season and their CPT codes.

ACIP VOTES TO CHANGE RECOMMENDATIONS FOR GUILLAIN-BARRÉ SYNDROME MENINGOCOCCAL VACCINE

A history of Guillain-Barré syndrome (GBS) had previously been a precaution for Menactra (MCV4 vaccine, sanofi pasteur). Findings from two studies that examined more than two million doses of Menactra given since 2005 showed no evidence of an increased risk of GBS. Consequently, the Advisory Committee on Immunization Practices (ACIP) has voted to remove the precaution for use of Menactra in people with a history of GBS. This precaution did not apply to Menveo (Novartis) or

Menomune (sanofi pasteur) vaccines.

TEEN VACCINATION RATES INCREASING ACROSS THE US

According to [2009 National Immunization Survey-Teen \(NIS-Teen\)](#) conducted by the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), which provides estimates of coverage for adolescent vaccination at the national, state and selected local area levels, there were increases in the percentage of adolescents who had received vaccines routinely recommended for 11 and 12 year-olds. Specifically for Illinois:

- For one dose Tdap vaccine, coverage went up about 15% to about 60%;
- For one dose of MCV4 vaccine, coverage went up about 12% to about 54%; and
- For girls who received at least one dose of HPV vaccine, coverage increased 7% to about 34%. However, for girls who received the recommended three doses of HPV vaccine, coverage was only 23% (a 10% increase).

More parents of adolescents are electing to protect their children from serious diseases such as pertussis, meningitis, and cervical cancer, but there is still room for improvement in providing immunizations to adolescents in Illinois.

ACOG ENDORSES GUIDELINES ON HPV VACCINE

Updating a 2006 statement, the American College of Obstetricians and Gynecologists (ACOG) has recommended that vaccines to prevent certain strains of the human papillomavirus (HPV) be given to girls aged 11 and 12 years, but emphasizes the importance of women getting pap smears beginning at age 21 regardless of vaccination status. Although the vaccines are most effective if administered before young women become sexually active, ACOG promotes "catch-up" shots for young women up to age 26. Published online in the journal *Obstetrics & Gynecology*, the statement also says HPV testing is not necessary prior to vaccination, as immunization remains an option despite positive tests results because the vaccines cover multiple HPV strains. Committee Opinion #467, "Human Papillomavirus Vaccination," is published in the September 2010 issue of *Obstetrics & Gynecology*.
